A monumental map of Antwerp, presented as a bird's-eye view, drawn by Joris Hoefnagel and published in Volume V of the Braun & Hogenberg 'Civitates Orbis Terrarum' atlas of town plans. The engraved Latin text lower left includes a tribute to Daniel Rogers (c.1538-91), a diplomat from the court of Elizabeth I, who wrote verses for the preface of Ortelius's 'Theatrum Orbis Terrarum' (published in Antwerp), and a 25-point key to the plan. On the map the major buildings are shown in profile, with the defensive walls shown in detail, especially the Duke of Alba's starshaped citadel upper left. Along the Schelde river are the quays that made the city so important.

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
